Fifth Grade Authors

The fifth graders recently completed a persuasive writing assignment, where they had to form an opinion on a topic. The students researched their topic in order to learn facts to use as supporting details. This type of "real-life" writing helped them make many connections and find a voice in their essay. Also, this "real-life" informational writing become the focus in the Common Core State Standards because students will need to know these skills for college and career readiness. Learning this type of writing can spark discussions and perhaps changes could be made in the world today. Here are some examples:

Archdiocesan Grants

The application forms for the Archdiocese of Detroit's tuition grants for 2013-14 are available—call the school if you'd like a paper copy sent home with your child. (The forms are processed by a company known as PSAS.)

You can also find the form and directions on the website of the Archdiocese of Detroit: www.aod.org. Go to "Schools," click on "Tuition Assistance and Scholarships," then "Private School Aid" to find the PSAS application and directions.

This year, the applications must be received by PSAS before April 8, and there is a \$20 fee to apply. Do NOT send your application for this award to school—it needs to be mailed to the address for PSAS listed in the information.

Remember to save a copy of your application—you must have applied for this Archdiocesan aid to be considered for any other assistance.
